About the Journey

Etgar 36 uses the Civil Rights narrative as a way to provide participants with the tools and inspiration to take the next step beyond social action: social activism. This journey uses the history, sites and current issues of each city as a springboard to highlight the relationship, and at times, the tension, of the Jewish and American identity. The journey is a mix of fun, sightseeing, education, and meeting with organizations and people who have been and are still involved in creating America.

Travel to Atlanta and from there by bus to important sites in the history of the fight for civil rights in America in the 20th century.

By the end of the trip, we will have a deeper understanding of why Jews, as a people who have known oppression, must care and act when others are oppressed.



By holding this trip during the week of Passover we have the sacred opportunity to explore the deeper themes and meaning of this holiday: freedom, human dignity, justice and our capacity to bring about change and transformation in ourselves, in our communities and in our world.

All eating venues will enable participants to avoid bread and leavened products but food will not be prepared in kitchens that are strictly kosher for Passover.
